SEAWEED Scavenger hunt

S eaweed is a natural occurrence along all coastal destinations during late spring and summer months. The name seaweed incorrectly implies that these brown algae have little value.

What is SEAWEED?

Each year there is a potential for large masses of sargassum (gulfweed, Sargasso, seaweed) to wash up along all coastal destinations during late spring and summer months. Seaweed comes from the Sargasso Sea in the North Atlantic Ocean.

HOW IS THE SEAWEED BEING MANAGED?

During heavy seaweed landings, the Galveston Island Park Board grooms the beaches at paid access points including East Beach, Stewart Beach, Seawall Urban Park, Dellanera RV Park and the West End Pocket Parks. The process includes relocating seaweed toward the back side of the beach to the toe of the dune or other limiting structure to allow the seaweed to decompose naturally while conserving the sand within the beach area. This effort helps protect the beach as a whole and assists in the building of dunes.

PLEASE BE TOLERANT OF SEAWEED. AT TIMES IT MIGHT BE UNSIGHTLY; HOWEVER, IT IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE GULF OF MEXICO ECOSYSTEM.
