



Bicycle Safety

The Fox River Trail is paved from the Trailhead to Rockland Road in De Pere. From Rockland Road south to the Brown County Line the trail is surfaced with very fine limestone or similar materials, and is not designed for high speed travel. Bicyclists should be alert on the unpaved section of the trail as it can become soft and wet, can erode quickly during heavy rains, and is subject to animal damage.

Here are a few general bicycle safety guidelines provided by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources:

- Wear bright clothing by day, white or reflective clothing by night. Shoes, pant leg clips, and **protective helmets are recommended.**
- Use a light and reflectors at night.
- Keep your bike under full control at all times.
- Keep your bike, especially the brakes, in safe condition.
- **Slow down and use voice or bell to warn others as you pass.**
- Be considerate of bikers coming your way, especially on hills. Keep right and allow room for oncoming traffic to pass.
- Keep at least two bike lengths between riders.

Trail Rules

Trail users should be aware that trail rules and permitted uses may be different for sections of the Fox River Trail. Watch for postings along the trail, or contact the Facility & Park Management Office for additional information.

The following rules apply on the Fox River Trail:

- All motorized vehicles including all-terrain vehicles and motorized bikes are **not** permitted.

- Trail Hours: 5:00 AM – 9:00 PM

- Dogs must be leashed and under control at all times. Leashes cannot exceed 5 feet in length.



Owners are responsible for cleaning up their pet's waste, and must have a waste pick-up device or bag with them when using the Fox River Trail.

- **Horses** are permitted only on the trail as posted from Klaus Street in Greenleaf south to the Brown County line.



- Respect adjoining property - please remain on the trail tread at all times and do not access trail through private property.
- Hunting is not permitted on any portion of trail corridor.
- Camping is not permitted within the trail corridor.
- Parking is available at designated access points.
- Please report violations to the Brown County Sheriff's Department at (920) 448-4200, or to the Brown County Facility & Park Mgt. Office at (920) 448-6242.

Trail Etiquette

- Trail users should keep right—please remain in your lane of travel and be courteous to other trail users.
- Pass slower traffic on their left; yield to oncoming traffic when passing.
- Bicyclists should call out or use bell to give a clear warning signal before passing.
- **Bicyclists yield to pedestrians; bikers & pedestrians yield to horseback riders (call out or use bell).**
- Travel at safe speeds!



Trail User Fees

Bicyclists, in-line skaters, roller skiers and horseback riders age 16 and over are required to purchase a Trail Pass when using this trail. **There is no fee for walking on the trail.** Fees collected go into a segregated account and are used for maintenance and operation of the trail. Trail users under the age of 16 do not need a Trail Pass.

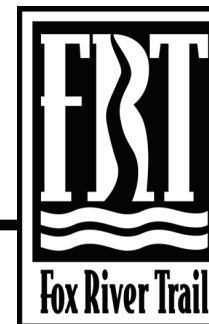
- Daily Passes are valid only for the day of purchase .
- Passes are issued to an individual and cannot be passed on to or used by another person.
- Trail passes must be presented to a Ranger or Officer upon request. Failure to purchase a Pass may result in a citation being issued.
- Annual Trail Passes are valid on any Wisconsin State Recreational Trail for the calendar year.
- Wisconsin Conservation Patron Licenses are valid on State Trails in lieu of a Daily or Annual Pass.

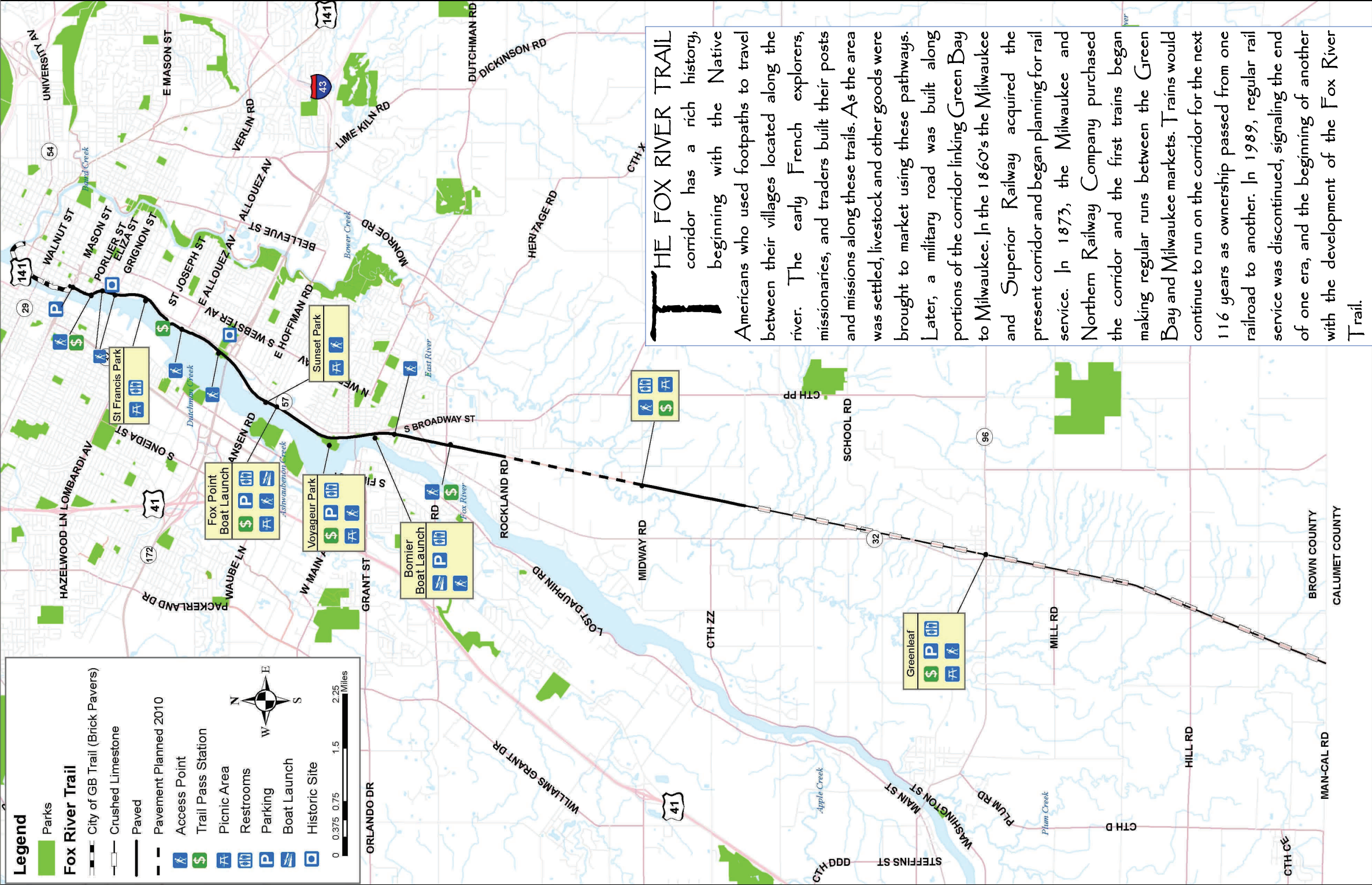

Fox River Trail



THE FOX RIVER TRAIL corridor has a rich history, beginning with the Native Americans who used footpaths to travel between their villages located along the river. The early French explorers, missionaries, and traders built their posts and missions along these trails. As the area was settled, livestock and other goods were brought to market using these pathways. Later, a military road was built along portions of the corridor linking Green Bay to Milwaukee. In the 1860's the Milwaukee and Superior Railway acquired the present corridor and began planning for rail service. In 1873, the Milwaukee and Northern Railway Company purchased the corridor and the first trains began making regular runs between the Green Bay and Milwaukee markets. Trains would continue to run on the corridor for the next 116 years as ownership passed from one railroad to another. In 1989, regular rail service was discontinued, signaling the end of one era, and the beginning of another with the development of the Fox River Trail.
